WORDS FROM POPE FRANCIS.....

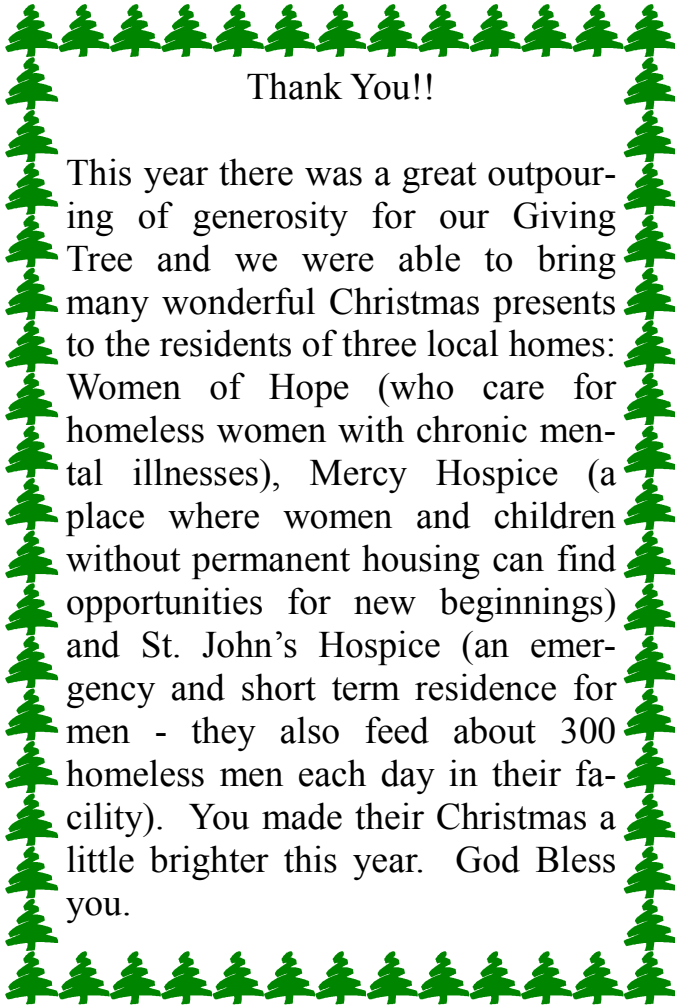

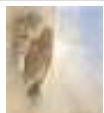

Blessed Margaret of Castello Home for Crisis Pregnancies

The Cathedral Basilica has adopted a new charitable organization to assist. The Blessed Margaret of Castello Home for Crisis Pregnancies is the longest continually active crisis pregnancy center in the Delaware Valley, having been founded in 1987. The home offers women everything they need to deliver their baby and get started building a new, stable environment. They provide for all of the residents' daily needs: clothing, shelter, and a secure, comfortable place to sleep in a supportive atmosphere. Who was Margaret Castello:

Born in 1287, she is considered the patron of the unwanted. She was born dreadfully deformed. A dwarf, totally blind, hunched-backed and so lame she could hardly walk. When she was only 6 years old, Margaret's father had her walled up in a small cell next to the parish hall. She could not get out but could attend Mass and receive the Sacraments. At 17, Margaret's parents took her on a pilgrimage, seeking a miraculous cure. When the miracle failed to occur, she was abandoned by her parents.

Margaret became a beggar and was befriended by other beggars. She eventually became a Dominican and dedicated herself to visiting the imprisoned and to comforting the sick and dying. She lived an incredible life of holiness until her death at the age of 33. When she died, the townspeople thronged her funeral, and demanded she be buried in a tomb inside the church. The priest protested, but a crippled girl was miraculously cured at the funeral, and he consented.

We will dedicate the Fourth Sunday of each month to collect items for the Home. We will provide more information as to their in the forthcoming weeks.

Tintinnabulum

The symbols that are used to indicate that a church has the dignity of a Basilica are the umbralino (umbrella) and tintinnabulum. Two years ago we put the umbralino in our sanctuary near the Cathedra - the Bishop's chair. Now, due to the generosity of a member of our Archdiocese, we now have the tintinnabulum. The tintinnabulum is a bell mounted on a pole, placed in our Basilica to signify our link with the Holy Father the Pope.

The tintinnabulum consists of a small gold bell within a golden frame crowned with the papal tiara and Keys of Heaven. If the Pope was to say Mass within our Basilica, the tintinnabulum would be used to lead the very special procession down the Basilica aisle. In the Middle Ages it served the practical function of alerting the people of Rome to the approach of the Pope during papal processions.

The pole for our tintinnabulum was hand carved in Italy. Also, it has two specially cast enamel plates. One has the picture of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, our patrons and the other (on the back) is of the exterior of our Cathedral Basilica.

Attention Parents of Children in Secondary and Elementary Schools
