WORDS FROM POPE FRANCIS.....

Reflecting on the words of any Pope helps us to grow in our faith—after all, he is our shepherd, the one who calls us on as one body in Christ. We will offer short excerpts taken from Pope Francis' addresses and homilies since his election which will reflect the themes that we can expect to hear again and again during his pontificate.....

Are We Open to God's Surprises?

Newness always makes us a bit fearful, because we feel more secure if we have everything under control, if we are the ones who build, program, and plan our lives in accordance with our own ideas, our own comfort, our own preferences. This is also the case when it comes to God. Often we follow him, we accept him, but only up to a certain point. It is hard to abandon ourselves to him with complete trust, allowing the Holy Spirit to be the soul and guide of our lives in our every decision. We fear that God may force us to strike out on new paths and leave behind our all-too-narrow, closed and selfish horizons in order to become open to his own. Yet throughout the history of salvation, whenever God reveals himself, he brings newness—God always brings newness—and demands our complete trust.

The newness which God brings into our lives is something that actually brings fulfillment, that gives true joy, true serenity, because God loves us and desires only our good. Let us ask ourselves today: are we open to "God's surprises"? Or are we closed and fearful before the newness of the Holy Spirit? Do we have the courage to strike out along the new paths which God's newness sets before us, or do we resist, barricaded in transient structures which have lost their capacity for openness to what is new? We would do well to ask ourselves these questions all through the day.

Domingo segundo de Pascua

LECTURAS CICLO A

Primera lectura: *Hechos de los Apóstoles 2, 42-47.* En la lectura se nos relata la vida de la primitiva comunidad cristiana: asidua a la palabra de Dios, a la eucaristía y viviendo la comunión de los bienes. El Señor la hacía crecer todos los días.

Segunda lectura: *I Pedro 1, 3-9.* En la lectura de la carta de Pedro, iremos reflexionando sobre nuestra condición de bautizados. Hoy nos regala esta perla: ustedes nunca han visto a Jesucristo y, sin embargo, lo aman; sin verlo creen en Él, experimentan un indecible gozo.

Evangelio: *Juan 20, 19-31.* En una primera aparición, Jesús trae a sus discípulos incrédulos los dones de la Pascua: la paz, la alegría, y el Espíritu Santo, la misión; y en la segunda, vence la incredulidad de Tomás.

Tiempo de Pasqua

Hemos celebrado el Domingo de Pasqua, día de victoria y de alegría para todos los cristianos. Y seguimos viviendo en la Liturgia el gozo de la resurrección de Jesús. Tiempo que se prolongará hasta la fiesta de Pentecostés.

Es el tiempo de la iglesia, de la comunidad cristiana, de los Hechos de los Apóstoles, libro que leeremos en las celebraciones y que les invito a leer en familia.

Guiados por el Espíritu Santo, los cristianos somos llamados a dar testimonio a los demás de que Cristo ha resucitado y vive.

Testimonio personal de lo que Jesús hace en nosotros, cambia nuestras prioridades, cambia nuestros corazones y nos hace vibrar en una nueva dirección.

Sin miedos, caminamos por la vida hacia una nueva meta, una vida plena y resucitada en el que ha vencido la muerte.

Sí, Cristo vive. Aleluya. Amén

¿Y despues de Jesús?

Después de la resurrección viene el testimonio.

El hecho de la resurrección se transmite de unos a otros escalonadamente. María Magdalena lo transmite a los discípulos y éstos a Tomás.

Tomás no acepta creer en Jesús resucitado transmitido a partir de lo que otros dicen: él; solo creerá, si ve.

Jesús afirma con claridad: Dichosos los que crean sin haber visto.

Este texto responde a la pregunta: ¿qué pasa cuando la cadena de testigos oculares se acaba? Pasa que podemos seguir creyendo, y además ser dichosos.

La cadena de testigos de la fe no puede romperse. Nosotros somos los testigos llamados a transmitir la fe.

Los sacerdotes en la iglesia, los padres en la familia, los catequistas en la catequesis y todos los bautizados somos enviados por Jesús a transmitir la fe en el resucitado.

Todos somos eslabones de esta larga cadena de testigos que empezó a existir desde la Pascua de Resurrección.

REGISTRACIÓN PARROQUIAL
