We gratefully welcome Father Ken Brabazon to our parish community. Father Brabazon comes to us having very much enjoyed growing up in the parishes of St. Barnabas (Southwest Philadelphia) and later, Epiphany of our Lord (South Philadelphia). Similarly, he is a proud alumnus of St. John Neumann High School. Immediately after completing his high school studies, he was accepted to and began formation at St. Charles Borromeo Seminary. Father Brabazon was ordained a priest in May of 2011, here at our own Cathedral Basilica. He has spent the last three years at his first priestly assignment, as a Parochial Vicar of St. Andrew parish in Newtown, Pennsylvania. Be sure to introduce yourself to Father Brabazon, and keep him in your prayers as he begins anew his priestly ministry, here at our Cathedral Basilica Parish.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Our Holy Father Pope Francis issued his first apostolic exhortation, *Evangelii Gaudium*, to invite all members of the Church to be filled with “The Joy of the Gospel” so as to become effective evangelizers of our communities throughout the world. He speaks persuasively of the need for the inclusion of the poor in society: “*Our faith in Christ, who became poor, and was always close to the poor and the outcast, is the basis of our concern for the **integral development of society’s most neglected members**. Each individual and every community is called to be an instrument of God for the liberation and promotion of the poor, and for enabling them to be fully a part of society,*” (EG, no. 186-187).

The solidarity with the poor expressed by Pope Francis, in both his challenging words and his simple lifestyle, has been inspiring Catholics and many other people of faith and good will to a renewed commitment to work toward ensuring that all people experience living conditions worthy of the dignity of the human person. For over 40 years, the **Catholic Campaign for Human Development** has demonstrated the solidarity with the poor that Pope Francis is exhorting us to embrace, funding thousands of community organizations throughout the U.S. that work to alleviate poverty and promote integral human development. Consisting primarily of low-income people, these organizations actively engage the poor and disadvantaged to identify and address the root causes of poverty. Funded projects are wonderfully creative collaborations among people of all faiths. CCHD invites us to “lend our voices to their causes, but also to be their friends, to listen to them, to speak for them, and to embrace the mysterious wisdom God wishes to share with us through them,” (EG, no. 198).

Each year the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops sponsors a nationwide collection in support of the Catholic Church’s longstanding efforts to reduce poverty by addressing its root causes. In the Archdiocese of Philadelphia this year, the annual collection will take place on the weekend of July 12 and 13. Funds collected support anti-poverty projects across the country, and in the communities and neighborhoods of our own region, that enable our less fortunate brothers and sisters to become agents of their own progress and human development. Despite the much touted economic recovery, more than 40 million Americans still live in poverty today, mostly good and honest people who are not yet able to share fully in the blessings taken for granted by many in our society. Through your contribution to the Catholic Campaign for Human Development, you assist your neighbors to break the cycle of poverty and achieve the dignity of self-reliance in their pursuit of a better future for themselves, their families, and their communities. In hopes of a better future for them and their children, I ask God’s blessing upon you for your generous response to this year’s appeal.

WORDS FROM POPE FRANCIS.....

Reflecting on the words of any Pope helps us to grow in our faith—after all, he is our shepherd, the one who calls us on as one body in Christ. We will offer short excerpts taken from Pope Francis' addresses and homilies since his election which will reflect the themes that we can expect to hear again and again during his pontificate.....

He Forgets, He Kisses You, He Embraces You

It is not easy to entrust oneself to God's mercy because it is an abyss beyond our comprehension. But we must! "Oh, Father, if you knew my life, you would not say that to me!" "Why, what have you done?" "Oh, I am a great sinner!" "All the better! Go to Jesus: he likes you to tell him these things!" He forgets; he has a very special capacity for forgetting. He forgets, he kisses you, he embraces you, and he simply says to you, "Neither do I condemn you; go, and sin no more" (cf. John 8:11). That is the only advice he gives you.

How Can We Not Share This Treasure?

We believe in the Risen One who conquered evil and death! Let us have the courage to "come out of ourselves," to take this joy and this light to all the places in our lives! The resurrection of Christ is our greatest certainty; he is our most precious treasure! How can we not share this treasure, this certainty with others? It is not only for us; it is to be passed on, to be shared with others. Our testimony is precisely this.
