Dear Parishioners - Greetings in the Lord!

Our parish convent has been closed for one year since the departure of the Sisters of Saint Joseph of Chestnut Hill. For almost sixty years the convent was the home to the Sisters who served the Cathedral Parish, the parish school, archdiocesan high schools and a variety of ministries within the Archdiocese. As a parish—and many of us personally—are most grateful for the consecrated life of the Sisters of Saint Joseph and we miss their presence among us. The diminishment of their numbers as a congregation led to the decision for the Sisters to no longer be able to maintain this convent home. Our prayers continue for the Sisters who have served the Cathedral Parish so faithfully and generously over the years. Our prayers also include the intention for an authentic renewal of the consecrated life here in the Archdiocese so we may once again see many responding to this beautiful vocation.

With the closing of the convent there were no immediate plans for its use by the parish or the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. So, it stood empty for the past year. Within the last two weeks I was approached by the Neo-catechumenal Way, a community that has recently established itself in the Archdiocese in three of our parishes and with a seminary, to rent the convent for at least a year. A Catholic family—parents and eleven children—belonging to the Neo-catechumenal Way was in need of a temporary home. I discussed the proposal with the Archbishop, members of the parish staff and several parishioners. A few concerns were raised but in the end the motive of Christian charity prevailed. So, we have new neighbors! We welcome them and pray God will bless them in their new home.

Also, you may have noticed that now on both sides of the front lateral banks of pews in the Basilica that there are “pew cuts.” These “pew cuts” have been made with the recommendation of our archdiocesan *Office for Persons with Disabilities* to provide a welcoming and comfortable place for those who make use of wheelchairs and their companions. The pew cuts are a reminder to us of how important it is for our buildings to provide as much as possible for the access of all. Our parish greeters have been asked to indicate the optional use of these new areas for persons with disabilities.

The Holy Spirit Drives Us Forward

The older theologians used to say that the soul is a kind of sailboat; the Holy Spirit is the wind that fills its sails and drives it forward, and the gusts of wind are the gifts of the Spirit. Lacking his impulse and his grace we do not go forward. The Holy Spirit draws us into the mystery of the living God and saves us from the threat of a Church which is Gnostic and self-referential, closed in on herself; he impels us to open the doors and go forth to proclaim and bear witness to the good news of the gospel, to communicate the joy of faith, the encounter with Christ.

It is urgently necessary to find new forms and new ways to ensure that God's grace may touch the heart of every man and of every woman and lead them to him.
