Dear Parishioners,

The Jubilee Year of Mercy can easily become like so much white noise in our contemporary lives. We know it is in the background but it is really not impacting us in any way. This is simply the nature of our very busy lives and very busy times. However, the Jubilee Year of Mercy calls us to a new attentiveness to the Mercy of our Father in heaven. He is constantly reaching out to us and drawing us to himself, wanting us to know of his desire to forgive our sins and fill us with his love and grace. Lent, the time of conversion and anticipation of the new life of Easter, offers an excellent opportunity for us to hear this invitation to divine Mercy. 24 Hours for the Lord is a special opportunity this Lent to do just this.

Pope Francis directed in the Bull of Indiction of the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy, *Misericordiae Vultus* that, "The initiative of '24 Hours for the Lord,' to be celebrated on the Friday and Saturday preceding the Fourth Week of Lent, should be implemented in every diocese." All throughout the Archdiocese of Philadelphia churches and chapels will be open for this period as much as possible to give clergy and faithful additional opportunities to encounter the Mercy of the Lord in his Sacraments. The chief elements of the *24 Hours for the Lord* are prayer before the Most Blessed Sacrament and the opportunity for the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation.

12:05 PM Mass in the Chapel

4:00 PM Exposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament in the Basilica

4:15 PM - 5:00 PM Confessions available in the Basilica

5:15 PM Reposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament followed by the Anticipated Mass for Sunday

LIVING STEWARDSHIP NOW

Fruitful or Productive

"Yes," said Joel, "I'm hooked on productivity. I run a business, and my wife and I have three young children. I have to produce and my employees have to produce if we're to accomplish anything. My days are jam-packed. If there's any time left over I spend it with my family." Joel's thinking on productivity received a shake-up at a men's retreat. The retreat leader asked a question. "When you think of Jesus, do you think of him with a daily to-do list? ('Three people healed today. Two fast comebacks to the scribes and Pharisees. One really great parable told. Oh yes, and dinner for 5,000. And I got the disciples to distribute the leftovers. A very good day. Well done, me')." Joel listened intently. "Jesus spoke wisely and constantly extended mercy and grace. He might now and then retreat from the crowds, yet when he was with people, he was really with them. He saw needs that others could not see. He loved people well. But was he productive? Productivity can become a mind-set of constantly moving forward. Being busy, not at times and in moderation, but as a lifestyle. Productivity seeks what fruitfulness claims as its starting point—the assurance of God's presence and love." Fruitfulness, Joel saw, allows you to be fully present in the moment. Fruitfulness is deeply rooted in the soil of God's grace. Fruitfulness requires a fundamental trust in the Holy Spirit, like compost around the roots of the fig tree in today's Gospel. The Spirit is working at all times and in all places and, if we allow it, is at work in us—busy or not.

Living Stewardship Now

Put aside the lists and waste some time with God—pray, take a nap, play with the kids, admire nature. It may not be productive, but it will be fruitful.
