LA CORRESPONSABILIDAD

EL NÚMERO 9

Para el doctor Greer el punto crítico vino acompañado de un número. Fue en el año de 1984 cuando él era un joven residente en un hospital de Miami y su paciente era un vagabundo que la policía había traído. El hombre tenía una tuberculosis tan avanzada que va no podía ni hablar. Nadie sabía su nombre y su única identificación era un letrero que decía "Número 9" a los pies de su cama. El doctor Greer hizo todo lo posible por encontrar parientes o amigos del señor, alguien que pudiera consolar a este hombre que estaba más allá de cualquier ayuda de la medicina moderna. No se encontró a nadie y el hombre murió unos días más tarde, solo. El doctor Greer es gastroenterólogo y especialista del hígado. Puede tener un consultorio de primera en el prominente vecindario de Ocean Drive en Miami, pero el paciente número 9 ha dejado sus huellas. El doctor Pedro José Greer se dio cuenta de que todo paciente tiene una historia y un alma cuvos síntomas son la máscara que esconde los sueños. esperanzas, éxitos y fracasos de una vida humana. No mucho tiempo después de la muerte del paciente número 9 el doctor Greer abrió el centro clínico Camillus Health Concern en Miami. En un cuarto de siglo Camillus ha llegado a prestar sus servicios a más de diez mil personas vagabundas al año, hombres, mujeres y niños, personas que no tienen acceso a una buena asistencia médica. Todos los años en la Clínica de San Juan Bosco del doctor Greer se atienden a seis mil inmigrantes, muchos de ellos indocumentados, en un ambiente cálido y amable. Para Greer el diagnóstico y el tratamiento son las partes más fáciles de ser doctor. Lo más importante es la compasión hacia el paciente como persona. El doctor Greer ha recibido tres reconocimientos presidenciales, dos reconocimientos papales y del MacArthur Foundation Genius Fellowship. Pedro José Greer ha atraído la atención de los ricos y poderosos, pero su misión continúa siendo la misma. Cada vez que él ayuda a alguien asegura que el paciente número 9 nunca sea olvidado. Toda persona tiene su nombre propio. Toda persona es tratada con esmero v compasión.

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Jesus' Disciples for Today

We now find ourselves moving into the heart of the Lenten season. Shifts might be taking place in our daily routines, for in some cases, we are making attempts to review our life choices and modify, change or eliminate them. This truly is a time of conversion, and we now have people of the parish, not yet Catholic, who are among the "Elect" who will become one with us at Easter. Their conversion stories are good examples for each of us who want and/or need to make changes in some of our choices from day to day. God's grace is the source of strength upon which we can draw, to move into a lifestyle which might bring us to a new level of holiness. We might be tempted to think that "holiness" is for others, but in reality, the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus was for that very reality in each of our lives. During Lent in particular, we are called to focus on our interior or spiritual life. It means that quiet times and prayerful spaces are needed to do just that.

The Sunday Scriptures are part of our story of faith. Yes, those same Scriptures which Jesus learned as a child by going to Synagogue and Temple, are ones which call us as well to come to know and to love God: to realize that God is and needs to be central in our lives. As a young child, Our Lord was in a family of faith where Mary and Joseph taught him these elements of his Jewish culture and heritage. Then we come upon the reality of Jesus who in his short-lived public ministry, lived his human and divine life among us and we see how he had to struggle when so many would not believe that He indeed was the Messiah. We know that He continued to grow in wisdom, age and grace from the time He was a child. That awareness of His Godliness became so real with the events that brought Him to His Baptism by John, and then onto mission. His active ministry and calling of His disciples propelled Him to bring to life, a spirituality of LOVE. He was going to have to change some thinking which called for "an eye for and eye; and a tooth for a tooth". No longer would we live in a mindset where LOVE did not overcome darkness and revenge: such is the true life of a Christian and as a Catholic, fortified as well with the graces of our Sacraments.

It became noticeable to Jesus, that almost everyone around him did not understand the holiness of their very own bodies. He told us that we were Temples of the Holy Spirit and that we would need to respectfully treat our own, and the bodies of others with love, compassion, mercy and justice. We would respect ourselves and others as the paramount and glorious creation of God. Are we able to absorb such grandeur? Are we willing to maintain a rigorous restraint when others hurt us and we want to retaliate? We need not fear, but pray for the grace to know that God will help us in our life-long journey to holiness.

LIVING STEWARDSHIP NOW

NUMBER 9

For Dr. Greer, the tipping point came with a number. He was a young resident in a Miami Hospital in 1984 and his patient was a homeless man the police had brought in. The man had advanced tuberculosis and was so far gone he could not speak. No one knew his name: he was identified only by "Number 9" at the end of his bed. Dr. Greer did everything he could to find relatives or friends—anyone who could comfort this man who was past the help of modern medicine. No one was found, and the man died a few days later, essentially alone. Dr Greer is a gastroenterologist and liver specialist. He could have a top-notch practice on wealthy Ocean Drive, Miami, but Patient Number 9 had left his mark. Dr. Pedro José Greer realized that every patient has a story and a soul: their symptoms are the mask that conceals the dreams, hopes, successes, and failures of a human life. Soon after Patient Number 9 died, Dr. Greer opened Camillus Health Concern in Miami. In a quarter century of service, Camillus has grown to serve ten thousand homeless men, women, and children annually—people who have no other reliable access to health care. Each year at Greer's Saint John Bosco Clinic, six thousand immigrants—many undocumented—receive medical treatment in a warm and sympathetic setting. For Greer, diagnosis and treatment is the easy part of doctoring. What's more important is compassion for the patient as a person. The winner of three presidential awards, two papal awards, and the MacArthur Foundation Genius Fellowship, Pedro José Greer has attracted the attention of the rich and powerful, but his mission remains the same. Everyone he helps ensures that Patient Number 9 is never forgotten. Everyone has a name. Everyone is treated with care and compassion.

Living Stewardship Now

If you have medical experience, try volunteering in a parish or community clinic that serves the poor. If you speak a second language, share your time with new immigrants, teaching them English or helping them to adjust to life in this country.
