

Dear Parishioners,

Today is the Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time! With Easter Time and the two solemnities of the Most Blessed Trinity and the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ behind us, we begin the summer Sundays of Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time, or the time during the year, does not have a distinct character like Advent and Christmas Time or Lent and Easter Time. Rather, instead of focusing on a specific aspect of the Mystery of Christ, Ordinary Time, especially the Sundays, points to the Mystery of Christ in all its aspects (see General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar, 1969, n. 43). This information about Ordinary Time helps us to listen to the Word of God and, with the help of the Holy Spirit, to apply it to our Christian lives. Ordinary Time is an occasion to deepen our understanding of the Gospel message, to examine how we live from it, and seek all the more to be a faithful disciple of Jesus.

This Sunday, the Gospel for Mass, gives us an indication of how the Kingdom of God grows and spreads itself among us. The Kingdom is living according to God's plan for us, faithful to his ways with the aid of divine grace and mercy. We cannot bring about the Kingdom of God. Only God can bring about his Kingdom and he does so. He invites us constantly as we listen to his word, celebrate the Sacraments and keep the Commandments, to live according to his plan with his help. God grows and matures his Kingdom among us. The Kingdom is the beginning of heaven on earth. Yes, the Kingdom of God is like a mustard seed, the smallest of all seeds but yet becomes the largest of plants. God sows the seed of his Kingdom. When we respond to God, we are a part of the Kingdom growing in ways beyond our imagining. Let us be even more fervent as we pray each day, "thy kingdom come," that truly we may do our part to manifest the presence of the Kingdom of God.

REFLEXIÓN DEL RECTOR

Estimados feligreses,

¡Hoy es el undécimo domingo del tiempo ordinario! Con el tiempo de Pascua y las dos solemnidades de la Santísima Trinidad y el Santísimo Cuerpo y Sangre de Cristo a nuestras espaldas, comenzamos los domingos de verano del Tiempo Ordinario. El tiempo ordinario, o el tiempo durante el año, no tiene un carácter distintivo como el tiempo de Adviento y Navidad o el tiempo de Cuaresma y Pascua. Más bien, en lugar de centrarse en un aspecto específico del Misterio de Cristo, el Tiempo Ordinario, especialmente los domingos, apunta al Misterio de Cristo en todos sus aspectos (ver Normas Generales para el Año Litúrgico y el Calendario, 1969, n. 43). Esta información sobre el tiempo ordinario nos ayuda a escuchar la Palabra de Dios y, con la ayuda del Espíritu Santo, a aplicarla en nuestra vida cristiana. El Tiempo Ordinario es una ocasión para profundizar en nuestra comprensión del mensaje del Evangelio, para examinar cómo vivimos de él y buscar aún más ser un discípulo fiel de Jesús.

Este domingo, el Evangelio para la Misa, nos da una indicación de cómo el Reino de Dios crece y se difunde entre nosotros. El Reino está viviendo según el plan de Dios para nosotros, fiel a sus caminos con la ayuda de la gracia y la misericordia divinas. No podemos lograr el Reino de Dios. Solo Dios puede realizar su Reino y lo hace. Nos invita constantemente mientras escuchamos su palabra, celebramos los Sacramentos y guardamos los Mandamientos, a vivir de acuerdo a su plan con su ayuda. Dios crece y madura su Reino entre nosotros. El Reino es el comienzo del cielo en la tierra. Sí, el Reino de Dios es como una semilla de mostaza, la más pequeña de todas las semillas, pero se convierte en la más grande de las plantas. Dios siembra la semilla de su Reino. Cuando respondemos a Dios, somos parte del Reino que crece de maneras más allá de nuestra imaginación. Seamos aún más fervientes al orar cada día, "venga tu reino", para que verdaderamente podamos hacer nuestra parte para manifestar la presencia del Reino de Dios.



EVANGELIZATION 101

OVERFLOW

"The apostle is a chalice full to the brim with the life of Jesus, and his overflow pours itself out upon souls." ~Soul of the Apostolate

The Church's basic definition of evangelization is as follows: the communication of the Good News of Jesus Christ to others. And this is true! However, in a world saturated by incessant communication, we can sometimes take a superficial view of what we mean by "communicating the Gospel." We can make the mistake of thinking that evangelization means simply that we need to talk about Jesus more. And while it most certainly does involve talking about Him more, evangelization doesn't begin here.

In the mind of the Church, the "communication of the Gospel" has its reference point first in our own communication with Jesus himself. It is not first an outward movement, but an inward one. Only when we are in regular and consistent communication (read, "communion") with Jesus through prayer are we capable of communicating Him to other people. It is not enough for us to know a lot about our Catholic Faith and then explain it to others. Deeper and more important is the relationship of intimacy that we have with the person of Jesus Christ. As this relationship with Him grows in us, we become "filled with Christ" to the point that it begins to overflow within us because it can't be contained. Evangelization is that overflow.

Understood in this way, evangelization is the most natural thing in the world. It is simply the welling up and spilling over of our own abiding friendship with the person of Jesus Christ.

As baptized Catholics, we have the inescapable call to labor with Christ for the salvation of souls. No one is exempt from this mission. But our first task is not to look outward, it is to look inward. We must ask ourselves, "How is my prayer life? Do I experience intimacy with Jesus Christ on a regular basis?" In a highly action-oriented world, we can sometimes think that these questions about prayer are minor, that they are "nice" but don't really impact our ability to do good works for God. But, in fact, the answer to these questions directly determines whether or not we will actually be serving God at all in our actions. The great spiritual masters tell us: we are only fruitful in proportion to the intensity of our prayer life.

So, if we want to bring people back to the Faith and help them find God, our very first task is to do the hard work of developing a regular and consistent spiritual life and to root out those things that are preventing it. It is very easy to talk about God and it is very easy to enact initiatives that use all the right discipleship language. But it is a whole other thing to do the necessary interior work in our souls to truly commune with Jesus in such a way that His life within us overflows to others. In the words of the great spiritual writer, Fr. Jean-Baptist Chautard, O.C.S.O.,

But as for Satan, he, on the contrary, does not hesitate to encourage a purely superficial success, if he can by this success prevent the apostle from making progress in the interior life: so clearly does his rage guess what it is Our Lord values most highly. To get rid of a diamond, he is quite willing to allow us a few sapphires. (Soul of the Apostolate)
