### Dear Parishioners,

Today is the Second Sunday of Advent! This Sunday we are introduced to Saint John the Baptist, the precursor of the Lord and our companion to prepare for the Birth of the Savior. The Baptist boldly preaches that our preparation must be thorough and focused on the promise of salvation that comes with Jesus. In other words, our preparation during Advent must be real and practical, with plans for a good Advent Confession and decisions that focus more on the presence of Christ in our lives. The salvation that comes with the Birth of Jesus is so immediate and intimate that John cries out "all flesh shall see the salvation of God" (Luke 3: 6). The Nothing Compares to Being There initiative of the Archdiocese, with its emphasis on the irreplaceable need to be *in person* for the celebration of Mass, invites us to see *in person* the salvation of God in the flesh with the celebration of the Sunday Mystery of the Eucharist.

This Wednesday, December 8, 2021 is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, a Holy Day of Obligation. This Advent Holy Day commemorates the conception of Mary in the womb of her mother without any stain of original sin. This gift to Mary prepares her to be the worthy Mother of the Christ Child. Mary, under the title of the Immaculate Conception, is the Patroness of the United States of America. The Holy Day Mass schedule is:



### Part 2 of 4: What do I bring to a spiritual direction session?

When I arrive at my appointment, I usually come with a journal that may have questions for clarity. I may be struggling with a personal relationship and wondering how to lovingly deal with that person. I must realize that I am not coming to a counseling session, but to a focused time, to notice how my faith may help me. The same may be true when sharing a concern about a family member whose faith life seems non-existent. Thirdly, my own faith seems to have taken a turn for the worse, where God seems to be completely absent: these are important but a minimal sampling of concerns, which we bring to God with the help of our companion or director. One may offer an optional stipend to the director, but it is never expected.

## Evangelization

### "In illo tempore..." Advent Series (Pt. 2)

"At that time..." These words invite us to enter into a very specific place and time; whatever place and time that might be. On the Second Sunday of Advent this year we hear that at that time...

"In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was tetrarch of Galilee, and his brother Philip tetrarch of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias was tetrarch of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John the son of Zechariah in the desert."

Last week, we took some time to consider the role of vigilance in our Advent observance and the importance of a good confession to our proper preparation. Something else indispensable to our preparation it prayer. Regular, deeply meditative prayer is important for allowing the word of God we hear at Mass and even receive into our hearts in the Eucharist to "take on flesh" in our own place and time.

St. Ignatius of Loyola in his Spiritual Exercises encourages his disciples to reflect upon the reality of the Lord's Incarnation by using their imagination to fill in the details that are oft-overlooked in the Gospel of accounts of Jesus' life for the sake of brevity.

Luke, for his part was likely a physician and possessed a particularly analytical mind. He recounts to those reading his Gospel account:

"...I too have decided, after investigating everything accurately anew, to write it down in an orderly sequence for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the certainty of the teachings you have received."

The persons we hear noted as being present "at that time..." when the word of God came to John the Baptist in the desert are historically verifiable.

One praying over any given scene as St. Ignatius proposes may consider the people and places where the action happens. He may also consider who is there and what they are doing or saying and try to garner some fruit from that. One could try this with the Nativity of the Lord too. Many events and actions are left to the imagination of the reader. Joseph take his wife who is with child down to Bethlehem for the Census. There is a whole journey through the Judean wilderness about which scripture is silent. What happened? How do real people deal with the real problem of survival in the wilderness? What graces/gifts did they need? How did they respond to the word of God?

This way of meditating on God's word has a power to purify one's mind and heart of the many other images that can crowd out God's word and will at any given moment in favor of lesser things. Take time this week to try this method of prayer with some of the Gospel stories and welcome Jesus into your own place and time in a new way. *Come Lord Jesus, Come!*
