Dear Parishioners,

This is the Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. We listen to a rather ominous Gospel for this Sunday. The Gospel closes with the line, "By your perseverance, you will secure your lives (21: 19)." Jesus describes a future situation of great distress, confusion, and violence for his hearers, coming even from family members. However, he reassures his audience that in the midst of it all he is with them. The duty of the Christian in such dreadful circumstances is to persevere, to persevere in fidelity to Christ and his saving Word. When we think of the world today, there is also distress, confusion, and violence everywhere - in the world, in the Church, in the lives of so many. The persecution of Christians today far surpasses the persecutions of the first few centuries after the New Testament times. So, we hear the Lord in our day speaking clearly to us to hold fast to him and all that he teaches through his holy Church. His word cannot fail us and, in fact, gives us the path to peace and eternal life. At the same time, we need to support our perseverance with personal prayer for ourselves, our families and friends, the Church, and the world. Our perseverance will secure our lives!

This Sunday, the Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, marks the sixth World Day of the Poor. This year our Holy Father invites us to consider the words of Saint Paul, "Jesus Christ...for your sakes became poor" (see 2 Corinthians 8: 9). The poverty of Christ, through his life and especially on the cross, invites us to find in our own hearts solidarity with the poor. This solidarity awakens in each of us an awareness of those in need all around us and throughout the world. As we observe this World Day of the Poor may we hear more deeply the call to conversion away from selfishness and sin to a greater charity and generosity with regard to the poor. In the neighborhood of the Cathedral Parish, there are many poor and needy homeless men and women. Many times, we do not know what to do to help. We do know that they belong to us in Christ. They invite us to be attentive and kind. The poor can lead us to Christ, our common companion.

Join us for the Eucharistic Procession through the streets of Center City next Sunday, November 20, 2022, at 2:00 PM. Please assemble in the Cathedral Basilica at 2:00 PM.

Please keep the intention for peace in our City and an end to gun violence in our neighborhoods in your prayers. Our Lady, Queen of Peace, pray for us!

November is the Month of the Holy Souls. Let us remember especially during Mass and in our prayers at home all the Holy Souls in Purgatory. May they soon know the full glory of God in Heaven.

The second collection at Mass next Sunday will be directed to the religious education programs in the Cathedral Parish. Thank you so very much for all of your goodness and generosity to the Cathedral Parish, especially with the annual Parish Fall Collection (Block Collection) taking place at this time.

EVANGELIZATION

Prayer in the New Testament - Pt. III Growing in Prayer (Part VII)

Friends, last week we continued our study of prayer as it is taught us by Jesus Christ. Our time was spent reflecting on the several petitions of the great prayer Jesus explicitly teaches his disciples, the "Our Father". Jesus will continue to teach his disciples by way of certain parables that Christian prayer must not only be personal but also must be urgent (cf. Lk 11:5-13), patient (cf. Lk 18:1-8) and humble (cf. Lk 18: 9-14).

While it is important to listen to Jesus words in the scriptures it is also important to pay attention to his own example. We see Jesus in both Mark and Luke's Gospels (cf. Mk 1:35, Lk 6:12) passing time in prayer very early in the morning and even through the night. It is reasonable to conclude he was in the habit of doing this throughout his public ministry. Such persevering prayer would prepare Jesus in his humanity for the ultimate prayer he offers the Father in His Passion, Death and Resurrection.

On the night of the Last Supper, Jesus, gathered with his disciples, celebrates the Passover. This ritual meal, one of the principle liturgical prayers offered by the Jewish people will be context in which Jesus, the lamb of God, will be offered to the Father. Through this meal, he will establish for his followers the memorial which will not only call to mind his sacrifice but will actually make them sharers in it.

The Eucharist is the principle act of worship we offer as Jesus' followers. The work Eucharist means "thanksgiving." It is so because it is Jesus' own offering in which we share. In the Eucharist Jesus offers the work of human hands (bread and wine) which are symbolic of man's whole person being taken up in an act of praise. This time will also be the occasion for Jesus' parting words to his disciples and what has been called his High Priestly Prayer. (cf. Jn 13-17)

Jesus will make clear to his disciples that by way of their relationship with him, they are able to grow in relationship to the Father too. "Whoever has seen me has seen the Father." (Jn 14:9) Jesus promises to return after his brief departure and to take his disciples to be with him. He will effectively do this through the Holy Spirit who will intercede on their behalf with "inexpressible groanings." (cf. Rom 8:26)

On the way to the cross, Jesus prays through the night beginning with his prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane. Upon the cross, in the midst of his suffering, prayer continues. "Father, into your hands, I commend my Spirit." (Lk 23:46, cf. Ps 31:6) Jesus teaches us that in those moments where we feel most distant from God – even then, it is possible to cry out and be heard. Jesus' death is not the end of the lessons. Next week we will turn our attention to prayer in light of Jesus' resurrection and life in his Mystical Body, Church.
