

Dear Parishioners,

This is the Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time. The Word of God proclaimed to us this Sunday wants us to think about life after death. The brothers in the First Reading from the Book of Maccabees valiantly testify in the midst of their torture that they will live again forever after death. The Gospel from Luke likewise announces the Christian truth that God is a God of the living and not the dead. As we approach the conclusion of the Liturgical Year with the great Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, on Sunday, November 20, 2022, the readings and prayers for Mass on these preceding Sundays direct our thoughts to what we traditionally call the four last things, heaven, hell, death and judgment. As Christians, we have been born and baptized for eternal life. We are constantly encouraged by the Word of God and the teachings of the Church to live this life as a rehearsal for the next life. This was the encouragement Saint Paul gives to the Thessalonians and to us this Sunday. "We are confident of you in the Lord that what we instruct you, you are doing and will continue to do. May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the endurance of Christ (2 Thessalonians 3:4-5)." As we pray with the Church this Sunday and the next few Sundays, let us be inspired to examine our Christian lives in light of the end of our own earthly lives, the judgment our lives will make for or against our own eternity. May this examination lead us to a new resolution to direct our hearts truly to the love of God in all things until we are one day, with God's help, face to face with his love in glory.

We continue to pray for the Holy Souls all throughout this month of November. It is still possible to obtain a Memorial Candle for your beloved deceased to be placed among the others at the All Souls Altar in the Basilica. Additional forms for these candles are at the All Souls Altar. Mass is offered occasionally at the All Souls Altar throughout this month for those who are remembered there through the Memorial Candles, the All Souls envelopes, and other notices of the deceased. May these souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace! Each Sunday of November, the musical prelude to Mass will focus our attention on praying for the Holy Souls.

Next Sunday, the Cathedral Parish will participate in the Annual Seminary Collection. This collection taken throughout the Archdiocese of Philadelphia at this time of the year is one of the principal sources of income for the operation of Saint Charles Borromeo Seminary. Seminarian Michael Fairorth will be with us next Sunday to speak before each Mass about the Seminary. Your financial and prayerful support of the Seminary and its mission is greatly appreciated.

Invite a family member, a neighbor and/or a friend to join you for Holy Mass next Sunday at the Cathedral Basilica.

Please keep the intention for peace in our City and an end to gun violence in our neighborhoods in your prayers. Our Lady, Queen of Peace, pray for us!

The second collection at Mass next Sunday will be directed to the Annual Seminary Collection. If possible, please make use of the on-line opportunities of making your weekly offering. REFLEXIÓN DEL PÁRROCO

Estimados feligreses,

Este es el Trigésimo segundo domingo del Tiempo Ordinario. La Palabra de Dios que se nos ha proclamado este domingo quiere que pensemos en la vida después de la muerte. Los hermanos en la primera lectura del libro de los Macabeos testifican valientemente en medio de su tortura que volverán a vivir para siempre después de la muerte. El evangelio de Lucas también anuncia la verdad cristiana de que Dios es un Dios de vivos y no de muertos. A medida que nos acercamos a la conclusión del año litúrgico con la gran Solemnidad de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo, Rey del Universo, el domingo 20 de noviembre del 2022, las lecturas y oraciones de la Misa de estos domingos precedentes dirigen nuestros pensamientos a lo que tradicionalmente llamamos las cuatro últimas cosas, cielo, infierno, muerte y juicio. Como cristianos, hemos nacido y bautizado para la vida eterna. La Palabra de Dios y las enseñanzas de la Iglesia nos alientan constantemente a vivir esta vida como un ensayo para la próxima vida. Este fue el aliento que San Pablo da a los Tesalonicenses y a nosotros este domingo. "Tenemos absoluta confianza en el Señor de que seguirán haciendo lo que les mandamos, como ya lo hacen. EVANGELIZATION

Prayer in the New Testament - Pt. II Growing in Prayer (Part VI)

Friends, last week we continued our study of prayer as it is taught us by Jesus Christ. We looked at the reasons why the Son of God becomes the Son of Man and learned that one of the primary reasons he does so is to be our model of holiness. (cf. CCC 459) We learned that Jesus teaches us to pray not only by providing us the words we are to use but by every aspect of his person.

Today we want to examine the response of Jesus to his disciples' request to teach them to pray; we want to examine the Lord's Prayer, the "Our Father." In the Gospels of Matthew and Luke we see Jesus share with his disciples the words they are to use when praying. Matthew's account of the Our Father is the more familiar of the two as we pray this version each time we participate in Holy Mass.

Tertullian, an early Church writer once wrote that The Lord's Prayer "is truly the summary of the whole Gospel." (cf. CCC 2761). It is given by our Lord and contains within it several specific petitions. First, we acknowledge our relationship to God as Father and pray his name be hallowed. This means to make something holy. When we pray this, we do not make God's name holy but rather demonstrate our loving adoration of his holiness which makes us holy. Second, we pray that his kingdom, his reign be manifest. This refers both to the fullness of the kingdom at the end of time with Jesus second coming as well as God's present reign in the hearts of men. We pray that all men, women and children would let God reign in their hearts.

Third, we pray that His will be done on earth as it is accomplished in heaven. God wills our holiness, that is our salvation. He desires that all men be saved — so should we. Prayer opens our eyes to the specific ways this may unfold in our lives and others too. Fourth, we beg our daily bread. This encompasses all those needs we realize in life, both material and spiritual. The word "daily" actually may be translated more exactly as "super-substantial." St. Augustine see this as referring to the Eucharist.

Fifth, we pray that we might be forgiven our sins. We are reminded by what follows that in order to be forgiven, we must be forgiving as well. Jesus' words come to mind: "Blessed are the merciful, they will be shown mercy." (Mt 5:7) Sixth, we pray that we might not be tested. God tempts no one. We pray here that he would prevent us from falling. Finally, we pray that the Father may deliver us from evil. Evil here refers not only to evil in general but also the evil one specifically, the Devil. Next week we will continue to consider what Jesus teaches us about prayer as He approaches His Passion, Death and Resurrection.
