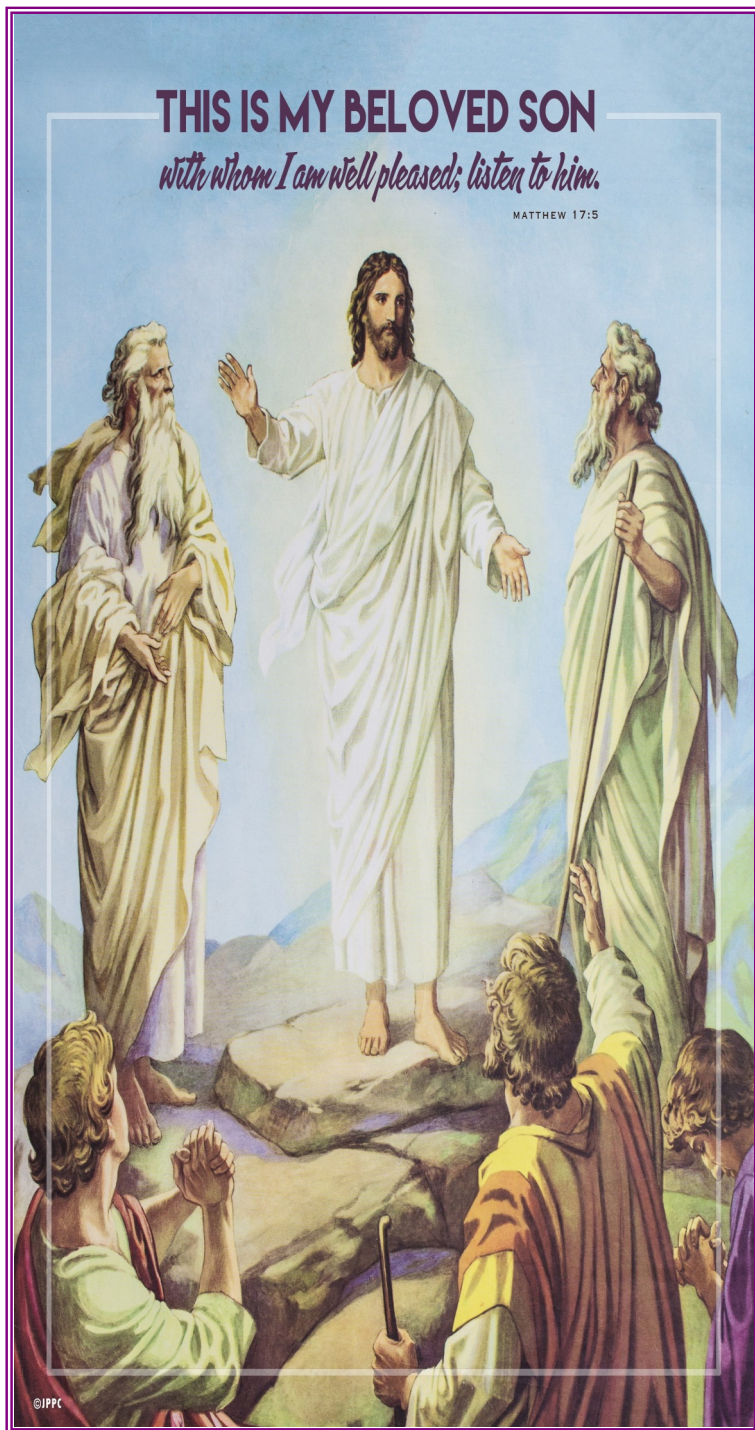

Dear Parishioners,

This is the Second Sunday of Lent. The Gospel for this Sunday is the Transfiguration of the Lord. Jesus appears on the mountain as if he is in the glory of heaven. This manifestation of Jesus to his apostles encourages them to persevere in following him, following him even though he has predicted his death to them. As we continue on our Lenten journey of conversion, of repenting of our sins and seeking a greater fidelity to the Gospel, we need the same encouragement given with the Lord's Transfiguration to his apostles. The apostles gave themselves over completely to Jesus and believed he was the Savior. Yet, we know from reading the Gospels that these same apostles met with difficulties in following their Lord and imitating his ways. His predicted suffering and death were a sure indication that they too would suffer and die with him. He gives them a glimpse of the promise of glory that will come to them because of their faith and fidelity. Likewise, today, as modern-day followers of our Lord, we know the struggle - both interiorly and exteriorly - to be disciples of Christ and imitate him. The same transfigured Lord gives us the glimpse of Easter, of a share in his glory, to keep us on the path of Lent, of conversion and greater faithfulness, to become more intentionally his disciples. The Second Sunday of Lent is also the Sunday of Lent to pray for the already baptized adult candidates for the Easter Sacraments that they too will persevere in their own preparation with a good Lent. Let us all continue to listen to the Lord these Lenten days with his word and in our prayer so that we may not become faint in our own fidelity to him and to encourage one another.

A small group among us gives additional meaning to the way we observe Lent. This group is our parish Elect. These catechumens were *elected* for the Easter Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist by Archbishop Perez on the First Sunday of Lent. *Election* means that they have completed a period of catechetical formation for the reception of the Sacraments. They know what the Christian life is about and have a better understanding of the Sacraments. Now, they observe Lent, a period of purification and enlightenment, to be prepared to be fully initiated into Christ and his Church with the Easter Sacraments at the Solemn Paschal Vigil on Easter night. As they prepare to be baptized they inspire those of us already baptized to be renewed in our baptismal integrity, to live as Christ intends for us. On the 3rd, 4th and 5th Sundays of Lent, the *Elect* participate in the *Scrutinies*. These are penitential rites to help them uncover in themselves what still needs to be healed so they are free from any impediment to Baptism. These *Scrutinies* take place at the 5:15 PM Anticipated Mass or the 11:00 AM Solemn Mass. The *Elect* pass through the *Scrutinies* to prepare for Easter. The baptized encounter the forgiveness of Christ in the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation to prepare for Easter. Let us also keep our Elect for the Easter Sacraments in our prayers during Lent.

An important devotion during Lent is the Stations of the Cross, following Jesus on his way to his suffering and death for us. This devotion can take place at home and in church. I encourage you to make this devotion a part of your Lent. We have the Stations of the Cross on the Fridays of Lent in the Cathedral Chapel following the 12:05 PM Mass and on the Sundays of Lent in the Cathedral Basilica in Spanish following the 12:30 PM Mass.

Thank you to all our parishioners and visitors for your goodness and generosity to the Cathedral Parish. The second collection next Sunday will be directed to the national collection for the Solidarity Fund for Church in Latin America. Abstinence from meat and fasting during Lent

The bishops of the United States prescribe, as minimal obligation, that all persons who are fourteen years of age and older are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, on **all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday**. Further, all persons eighteen years of age and older, up to and including their fifty-ninth birthday, are bound to fast by limiting themselves to a single full meal on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday, while the other two meals on those days are to be light. Keeping a voluntary fast throughout Lent is encouraged on the part of all.

The Way of the Cross will take place **each Friday of Lent immediately following the 12:05 PM Mass in the Chapel**. El Vía Crucis, the Way of the Cross in Spanish, will also take place each Sunday following the 12:30 PM in the Basilica.

REFLEXIÓN DEL PÁRROCO

Estimados feligreses,

Este es el segundo domingo de Cuaresma. El evangelio de este domingo es la Transfiguración del Señor. Jesús aparece en la montaña como si estuviera en la gloria del cielo. Esta manifestación de Jesús a sus apóstoles los anima a perseverar en su seguimiento, siguiéndolo aunque les ha anunciado su muerte. A medida que continuamos nuestro camino cuaresmal de conversión, de arrepentimiento de nuestros pecados y de búsqueda de una mayor fidelidad al evangelio, necesitamos el mismo aliento dado con la Transfiguración del Señor a sus apóstoles. Los apóstoles se entregaron completamente a Jesús y creyeron que él era el Salvador. Sin embargo, sabemos por la lectura de los evangelios que estos mismos apóstoles encontraron dificultades para seguir a su Señor e imitar sus caminos. Su sufrimiento y muerte predichos eran una indicación segura de que ellos también sufrirían y morirían con él. Les hace vislumbrar la promesa de gloria que les llegará por su fe y fidelidad. Asimismo, hoy, como modernos seguidores de nuestro Señor, conocemos la lucha interior y exterior por ser discípulos de Cristo e imitarlo. El mismo Señor transfigurado nos hace vislumbrar la Pascua, la participación en su gloria, para mantenernos en el camino de la Cuaresma, de la conversión y de una mayor fidelidad, para convertirnos más intencionalmente en sus discípulos. El segundo domingo de Cuaresma es también el domingo de Cuaresma para orar por los candidatos adultos ya bautizados a los Sacramentos Pascuales para que ellos también perseveren en su propia preparación con una buena Cuaresma. Sigamos todos escuchando al Señor estos días de Cuaresma con su palabra y en nuestra oración para que no desfallezcamos en nuestra propia fidelidad a él y para animarnos unos a otros.

Un pequeño grupo entre nosotros le da un significado adicional a la forma en que observamos la Cuaresma. Este grupo es nuestra parroquia Electa. Estos catecúmenos fueron elegidos para los Sacramentos Pascuales del Bautismo, la Confirmación y la Eucaristía por el Arzobispo Pérez el primer domingo de Cuaresma. Elección significa que han completado un período de formación catequética para la recepción de los Sacramentos. Saben de qué se trata la vida cristiana y tienen una mejor comprensión de los Sacramentos. Ahora observan la Cuaresma, un período de purificación e iluminación, para estar preparados para ser iniciados completamente en Cristo y su Iglesia con los Sacramentos Pascuales en la Solemne Vigilia Pascual en la noche de Pascua. Mientras se preparan para ser bautizados, inspiran a los que ya estamos bautizados a ser renovados en nuestra integridad bautismal, a vivir como Cristo quiere para nosotros. Los domingos 3, 4 y 5 de Cuaresma, los Elegidos participan en los Escrutinios. Estos son ritos penitenciales para ayudarlos a descubrir en sí mismos lo que aún necesita ser sanado para que estén libres de cualquier impedimento para el Bautismo. Estos Escrutinios tienen lugar en la Misa Anticipada de las 5:15 PM o en la Misa Solemne de las 11:00 AM. Los Elegidos pasan por los Escrutinios para prepararse para la Pascua. Los bautizados encuentran el perdón de Cristo en el sacramento de la Penitencia y la Reconciliación para prepararse para la Pascua. Mantengamos también a nuestros Elegidos para los Sacramentos de Pascua en nuestras oraciones durante la Cuaresma.

Una devoción importante durante la Cuaresma son las Estaciones de la Cruz, siguiendo a Jesús en su camino hacia su sufrimiento y muerte por nosotros. Esta devoción puede tener lugar en el hogar y en la iglesia. Los animo a que hagan de esta devoción parte de su Cuaresma. Tenemos el Vía Crucis los viernes de Cuaresma en la Capilla Catedral después de la Misa de las 12:05 PM y los domingos de Cuaresma en la Catedral Basílica en español después de la Misa de las 12:30 PM.

Gracias a todos nuestros feligreses y visitantes por su bondad y generosidad a la Parroquia Catedral. La segunda colecta el próximo domingo estará dirigida a la colecta nacional para el Fondo de Solidaridad para la Iglesia en América Latina. EVANGELIZATION

“Go Forth!”

Go Forth the Mass is ended (Part 2)

Friends, last Sunday we considered the great commission Jesus gives to you and to me before ascending to the Father of us all and sending the Holy Spirit upon the Church. God desires that all men and women would come to the knowledge and love of Himself in Jesus Christ. He desires that we who have believed not only share this desire but to do all we can to carry it out. Personal prayer is indispensable in making this happen. Still more important is our participation in the perfect prayer of Jesus in Holy Mass.

Each Sunday at Mass, our participation in Jesus’ own sacrifice concludes with one of four phrases by which we are sent forth during what are called the **“Concluding Rites”** of the Mass. The Mass is made up of several distinct parts. Let’s review the parts that make up Holy Mass so as to better understand them and the words that send us forth from the assembly to carry out the Lord’s work in the world.

Mass begins with the Introductory Rites wherein the faithful gather in the names of the Most Holy Trinity, acknowledge their sins and begin offering prayer to God the Father through, with and in Jesus Christ by way of the Holy Spirit. In the next major part, is the Liturgy of the Word, where God’s Word from the Sacred Scripture is read aloud and prepares the hearts to live the words we hear and to meet Jesus, God’s definitive Word, when he comes in the Eucharist.

In the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the bread and wine, the offering which become Jesus’ own Body and Blood are brought forward with the many intentions of God’s people. Once the priest consecrates them, they are definitively set apart as bearers of God’s presence in the midst of his people. Following the Liturgy of the Eucharist the faithful prepare to receive the Son of God in Holy Communion. With the Eucharist they receive the only-begotten Son and with Him, the sanctifying grace that makes possible eternal life here and hereafter.

The Concluding Rites make up the final part of the Mass. The people are given a blessing with the sign of the cross. This action, along with the sign of the cross with which Holy Mass begins make up the frame and seal of the Eucharistic Rite¹. With that, the Priest or Deacon sends the people forth: **“Ite, Missa Est.”** We translate these words **“Go forth, the Mass is ended.”** The Latin word **“Missa”** is where we get the word **“Mass.”** It comes from the word which means **“to send.”** The whole purpose of the Mass is not only to glorify God and sanctify his sons and daughters but also to send them forth to carry out the **“Great Commission.”** In some sense, the end is only the beginning! Next week, we will continue our look at the second form these words take and what they show us about proclaiming the good news Jesus offers mankind.
