Dear Parishioners,

Today is the Third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday! This Sunday in many ways indicates the nearness of the Birth of Jesus. For example, the Entrance for today's Mass is from Philippians 4: 4-5. "Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near." We rejoice because we know what the Birth of Jesus means for us and the whole world. Jesus is our Savior and Redeemer. His Birth is the fulfillment of all the promises of the Old Testament that God would save his people, rescue them from their sin, and bring them into everlasting communion with him. The upcoming celebration of the Nativity of the Lord renews these ancient promises by making them present to us in our here-andnow encounter with the Divine Infant. The Lord is truly near with his eternal gifts given again of salvation and redemption, gifts fully realized with his Death and Resurrection. Our personal rejoicing is more complete if we have taken seriously our own preparation for Christmas. We still have some time to prepare. May this Sunday impel us to prepare in a more deliberate and focused way for the Birth of Jesus.

An Advent Confession is a very important part of our preparation for Christmas. We have the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation available every day of the week at the Cathedral Basilica - on Sunday at 9:00 AM, 12:00 Noon in Spanish, and 5:30 PM, on Saturday at 4:15 PM and Monday through Friday at 11:30 AM. Parents bring your children, children bring your parents, and neighbors bring your neighbors, to the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. The Lord is kind and merciful!

The 2024 Parish Calendars distributed this Sunday and next Sunday have been made available to us by Mr. Christopher Dinan of the Dinan Funeral Home on Spring Garden Street, Philadelphia. I am very grateful to Mr. Dinan for his generosity to the Cathedral Parish. Please keep the calendar in a handy place in your home or office for easy reference for the Cathedral Basilica information and for the liturgical observances throughout the year.

This year the Fourth Week of Advent only includes the Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 24, 2023, with Christmas Day the next day, December 25, 2023. Thus, there are two Mass obligations back-to-back. The faithful are bound to observe the obligation of Holy Mass for a Sunday as usual for the Fourth Sunday of Advent with attendance at the Anticipated Mass or on Sunday morning. The faithful are bound to observe the obligation of Holy Mass for Christmas at the Vigil Mass or on Christmas Day. Let us look at these back-to-back obligations as opportunities to have God truly at the center of our Christian lives and give him the worship that is due rather than as some kind of burden or imposition.

Invite a family member, a neighbor, and/or a friend to join you for Holy Mass next Sunday at the Cathedral Basilica.



Evangelization

Joy to the World!

In our Advent meditations on Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love, so far we have looked at Hope – living in the "already, but not yet" of the two-fold coming of Christ: at Christmas and at the end of time. We have also reflected on Peace – the *disruptive Peace* of Christ which brings order, which is so desperately needed, into our world of chaos. Today, we consider Joy.

Joy to the World is a popular Christmas carol. But may I suggest that it is a great Advent carol. What?! Look at Verse 1: "Joy to the world! The Lord is come; Let earth receive her King; Let every heart prepare him room, And heaven and nature sing." Did *all* of the earth receive Christ when he was born? Scripture tells us he was not readily received by everyone. Isaiah tells us that the Suffering Servant, who prefigured Christ, "was despised and rejected... and we esteemed him not" (Is. 53:3). We know that one day, all on earth *will* receive the King: "Every knee should bow, in heaven, on earth, and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord" (Phil. 2:9-10). We look forward to this at Christ's *Second* Coming at the end of time. Heaven and nature will sing out and repeat the sounding joy for all eternity.

Verse 3: "No more let sins and sorrows grow, Nor thorns infest the ground; He comes to make his blessings flow Far as the curse is found." Certainly that is not our current experience; the world is not sin-free. Not yet, at least. Jesus told us that we should not be alarmed when we hear of the world's brokenness. "This must take place, but the end is not yet" (Mk. 13:7). On the Cross, Christ offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins. Raised from the dead, the Risen Christ now sits at the Father's right hand for all eternity: "He rules the world with truth and grace, And makes the nations prove The glories of his righteousness, And wonders of his love." He awaits the perfect moment - a time when all good things will come to fruition. So we have hope.

Joy to the World is clearly a song about Christ's Second Coming - when the full expression of his glory will be revealed. It doesn't really have anything to do with Christmas - Christ's *First* Coming. Or does it? After all, there can be no Second Coming without a First Coming. This song is all about the fulfillment of what Christ came to do in the first place. Christmas is not only a time to look back at the grace accomplished when the Word became Flesh; it is also a time to look *forward* to the grace that was accomplished for our future. The Cradle led to the Cross, which led to the Crown. When we sing this carol, we are proclaiming the ultimate Joy to be revealed. This is why we <u>can</u> sing "Joy to the World" at Christmas <u>and</u> in Advent. Come, Lord Jesus!

THREE PHILADELPHIA PRIESTS NAMED AUXILIARY BISHOPS FOR OUR ARCHDIOCESE

Pope Francis has named Rev. Keith J. Chylinski, Rev. Christopher R. Cooke, and Rev. Efren V. Esmilla as new auxiliary bishops of Philadelphia.

The Bishops-elect will succeed recently retired Auxiliary Bishops Edward M. Deliman and Michael J. Fitzgerald as well Bishop Timothy C. Senior, who had served as an Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia from 2009 until the summer of 2023 when he was appointed the Bishop of Harrisburg.

They will join Auxiliary Bishop John J. McIntyre, who has served in that capacity since 2010.

During this time of transition, Bishops-elect Chylinski, Cooke, and Esmilla will continue in their current priestly assignments.
