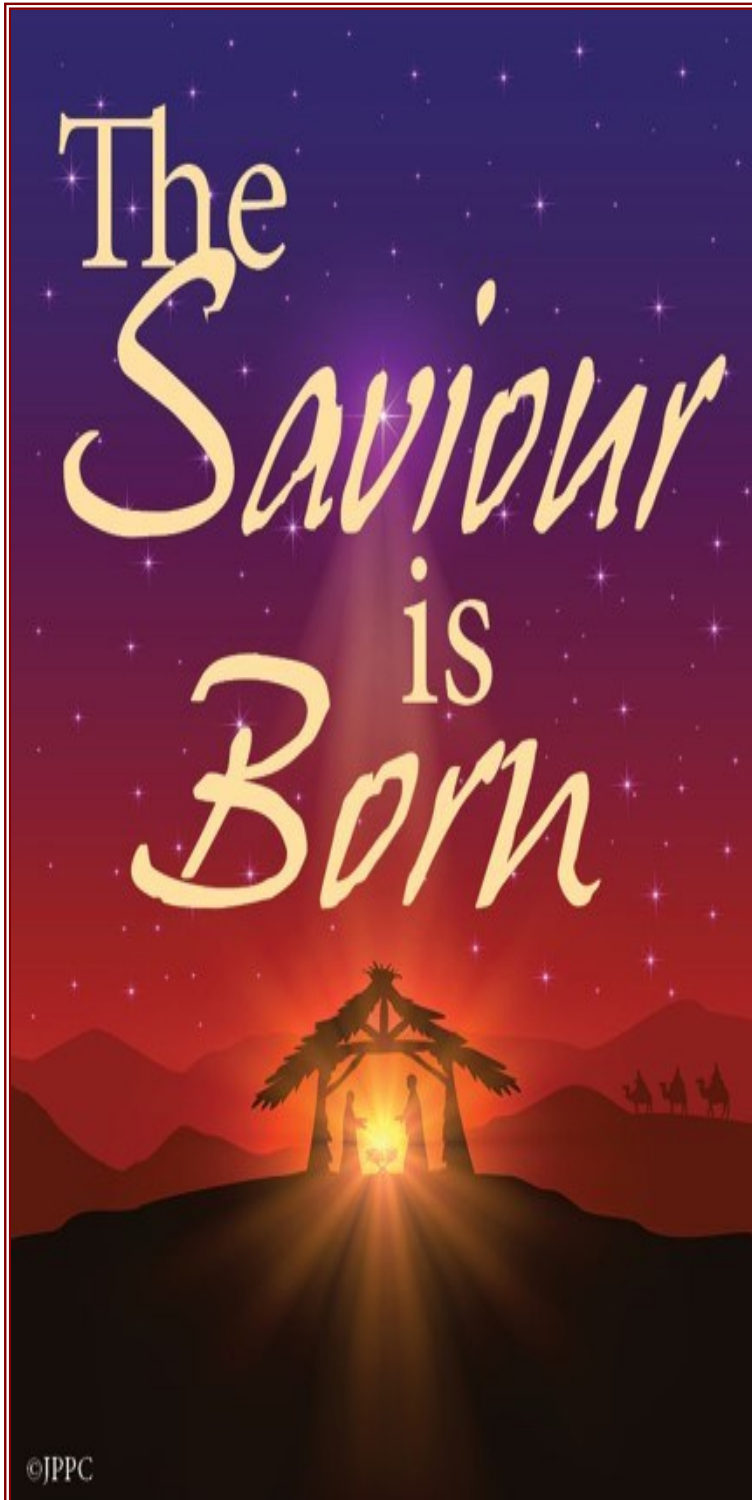

Dear Parishioners,

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Advent. This is Mary's Sunday. As we hear in today's Gospel the account of the Annunciation of the Lord (see Luke 1:26-38) we are reminded of the Blessed Mother's role in the Birth of her divine Son and her role in helping us prepare for his Nativity. Our heavenly Father chose Mary from all women from all time to be the Mother of Jesus. He prepared her for this great vocation with her Immaculate Conception and her faith to respond to the angel's announcement to bear the Savior of the world, God made man. Mary becomes at once the Mother of God and the Mother of all of us. By her example and as our Mother, she encourages us to be disposed as faithful Christians to God's plan for us, a plan that likewise includes a divine choice for each of us to receive his divine Son anew in our hearts and lives. This gift of the Birth of Jesus in us and among us is a gift that demands a response, like Mary's, of faith in God and his power to work in our lives for his glory and for the benefit of others. This Advent Sunday we turn especially to Mary. Let us ask her prayers to deepen our readiness for Christmas, to turn more and more to God's way, to turn away from sin and pledge to live from the grace that will come to us with the Birth of Jesus.

Please see the schedule for the Masses for the Solemnity of Christmas, Monday, December 25, 2023, found elsewhere in this edition of the parish bulletin.

Keep Christmas alive! Christmas Day, December 25, 2023, has a special octave or eight-day celebration which concludes on Monday, January 1, 2024, the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God. Christmas time lasts through to Monday, January 8, 2024, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, with the great Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord celebrated in the United States on Sunday, January 7, 2024. The world around us shuts down Christmas in some instances on December 26. As Christians, we are encouraged to keep the whole of Christmas Time alive with its festive character—including the decorations and carols. This is so that we may keep in our minds the great Mystery of Christmas. Jesus, the Son of God, takes on our humanity shares with us his divinity. This Mystery will never be understood fully by us. However, if we allow ourselves the whole of Christmas Time to ponder it and celebrate it, the more fully we will live from it.

I encourage all of you to display the Nativity Scene in your home - in some cases it may only be a Christmas card with the picture of the Birth of the Lord - and let it be an occasion to reflect on the great gift of Christmas. Reflect on how the Infant Savior brings to each of us the light of the Father's immense love and the promise of our redemption and salvation. God comes to us so that we can come to God. When you are in the Cathedral Basilica or Cathedral Chapel, please take some time to stop and pray at the Nativity Scene and trust in the nearness of the Savior to you and to all those you remember in prayer.

Thank you to all our parishioners and visitors for your goodness and generosity to the Cathedral Parish. The second collection next Sunday will be directed to the special maintenance projects of the Cathedral Parish. Hoy es el Cuarto Domingo de Adviento. Este es el domingo de María. Al escuchar en el evangelio de hoy el relato de la Anunciación del Señor (ver Lucas 1:26-38), recordamos el papel de la Santísima Madre en el Nacimiento de su divino Hijo y su papel al ayudarnos a prepararnos para su Nacimiento. Nuestro Padre celestial eligió a María entre todas las mujeres de todos los tiempos para ser la Madre de Jesús. Él la preparó para esta gran vocación con su Inmaculada Concepción y su fe para responder al anuncio del ángel de llevar al Salvador del mundo, Dios hecho hombre. María se convierte a la vez en Madre de Dios y Madre de todos nosotros. EVANGELIZATION

What's Love Got to Do with It?

Throughout these weeks of Advent, preparing our hearts for the First Coming of Christ at His Incarnation (on Christmas) and His Second Coming at the end of time, we have looked at this experience of *devout and expectant delight* through the lens of the four traditional themes of Advent: Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. Hope taught us to look at the “already, but not yet” aspect of Christ’s two-fold Coming; we looked for the *disruptive peace* of Christ to calm the chaos of our complacent world by His coming into it; we examined how *Joy to the World* actually focuses on the Second Coming, which can happen only because there was a First Coming. And today we examine Love.

Jesus told us that Love is the meaning of life. The greatest commandment, He says, is to love. But there’s a problem. In English, we use the word *love* for a whole lot of things. It’s not a very precise word. We can love our parents, and also love the Phillies. And we also tend to hyperbolize (*I love that song!*). All of this leaves little room for us to faithfully describe truly *awe-inspiring* experiences of love that we have. So how do we determine what true Love is, and how do we express it?

How can we know Love? We know true Love only because God loved us first. God first loved us so that we might love Him – not because He needs our love, but because we could not be what He created us to be, except by loving Him. A very key point to Jesus’ coming is that God comes intimately to each of us with the greatest love. He doesn’t come because He *needs* to. He comes because He loves us – and He loves us perfectly!

Love unexpressed is Love incomplete. The word Love in the Bible is often associated with sacrifice. 1 John 4:9-10 reminds us: “The love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent His only Son into the world so that we might have life through Him. In *this* is love, not that *we* have loved *God*, but that *God* loved *us* and sent His Son to be the expiation [restitution] for our sins.” The great reminder of Christmas is that our Heavenly Father not only *felt* love toward us, he *acted* on it! He didn’t leave us wondering; He didn’t keep his feelings to Himself. He sent His Son into the world, fragile and vulnerable, ultimately so that He might freely give His life for us. In the words of an ancient poem and song: *Love came down at Christmas*. Christ coming into our world and dying for us is true Love. It’s a kenotic – a self-emptying or self-sacrificing – love. That’s what true Love is. Do we offer that same sacrificial love to Him, and to others who we truly love?

In the few remaining hours of this Advent, let us continue to long for the coming of Christ at Christmas. And let us truly love one another well, so that at His Second Coming, we may be found worthy of the promises of Christ. Come, Lord Jesus!

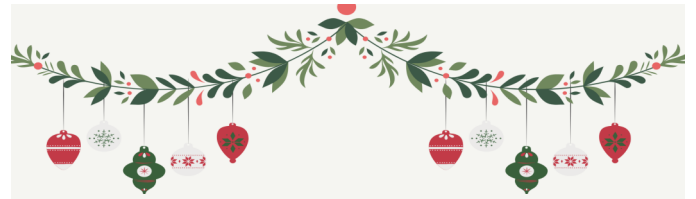
