Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday is the Second Sunday of Lent! We hear in the Gospel about the Transfiguration of the Lord. Jesus takes Peter, John, and James up the mountain to pray. As Jesus was at prayer, his appearance changed. The Apostles were given the great privilege of seeing the Lord in glory. This was an experience of great encouragement for the Apostles. They had been following the Lord, listening to his teachings, and trusting he was the Savior. They heard him predict the necessity of his own death for them and for the salvation of all. They desired to persevere in their fidelity to the call to be his disciples. The Transfiguration, as much as it was a promise of hope for the Apostles, is the same for us as Lent continues. We too want to be faithful as disciples and persevere, especially on our Lenten path to deeper conversion from sin to a more vibrant grace-filled Christian life. The Transfiguration is the assurance that the Lord will provide all that we need to be faithful to him now and have the promise of sharing his glory forever. Be encouraged! Persevere with your Lenten resolutions! Repent and believe in the Gospel!

Making a good Confession is a most important part of Lent. The schedule for Confessions is:

*On Sundays at 9:00 AM (Basilica), 12:00 Noon in Spanish (Chapel) and
5:30 PM (Basilica)*

*On Weekdays at 11:30 AM (Basilica) and on Saturdays at 4:15 PM
(Basilica)*

An important devotion during Lent is the Stations of the Cross, following Jesus on his way to his suffering and death for us. This devotion can take place at home and in church. I encourage you to make this devotion a part of your Lent. We have the Stations of the Cross on the Fridays of Lent in the Cathedral Chapel following the 12:05 PM Mass and in the Cathedral Basilica in Spanish following the 12:30 PM Mass. There are many wonderful resources on-line to help you make the Stations at home.

*This week we celebrate the Solemnity of Saint Joseph, the Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, on Wednesday, March 19, 2025. On Saint Joseph's Day, our Lenten penance and observance are put aside in favor of this Solemnity. The Church celebrates Saint Joseph's Day like a Sunday because of the great role the spouse of Mary and the foster father of Jesus played in the history of salvation. The Church also invites us to ask the heavenly help of Saint Joseph as the patron of the Universal Church and for each of us for a happy death. Please consider coming to Mass on Saint Joseph's Day in the Cathedral Chapel at 7:15 AM and 12:05 PM. *Saint Joseph, pray for us!**

I want to remind you that listening devices are available in the sacristy for anyone who has any difficulty with hearing during the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy. All that is necessary is to go to the sacristy before the celebration and ask one of the sacristans for the use of a listening device.

Thank you to all our parishioners and visitors for your goodness and generosity to the Cathedral Parish and to the Annual Catholic Charities Appeal. The second collection next Sunday will be directed to support the liturgical music programs in the Cathedral Parish. LENTEN SCHEDULE

The holy season of Lent concludes on Holy Thursday with the celebration of the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper. Lent is a preparation for the celebration of Easter.

The Lenten liturgy disposes both catechumens and the faithful to celebrate the Paschal Mystery, the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus. For catechumens, this takes place through the several stages of Christian initiation. For the faithful, this takes place through reminders of their own baptism and through penitential practices.

ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT AND FASTING DURING LENT

The Bishops of the United States prescribe, *as a minimal obligation*, that all persons who are **fourteen years of age and older** are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, on all the Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday. Further, all persons eighteen years of age and older, up to and including their fifty-ninth birthday, are bound to fast by limiting themselves to a single full meal on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday, while the other two meals on those days are to be light. Keeping a voluntary fast throughout Lent is encouraged on the part of all.

CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS

The description and schedule of the Lenten Rites for the Elect (catechumens) and Candidates for the Easter Sacraments will be announced in the Parish Bulletin all throughout Lent. These rites will take place at the **Saturday evening 5:15 PM Anticipated Mass** for Sunday and at the **Sunday 11:00 AM Solemn Mass**.

EVANGELIZATION

LENT-2ND SUNDAY OF LENT

We are now one and a half weeks into Lent; how are your Lenten resolutions going? Often, people make Lenten resolutions in three categories: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. These Lenten practices are meant to help to move us further from our sins and closer to God. Today, let us reflect on prayer.

What is prayer? Ultimately, prayer is talking with God. That is why it is so important that we pray every single day: we need to be communicating with God each and every day. Just as we talk to those closest to us each day, we need to be talking to God each day. Talking with God through prayer is how we open our hearts to His grace and love, and we stand in constant need of those to help us make the right decisions. Prayer need not be long or complicated, but it does need to be regular: every single day. The habit of daily prayer is one of the most foundational habits of the spiritual life (along with weekly Mass and monthly confession).

There are two broad categories of prayer: praying using fixed texts (e.g., the Our Father & the Hail Mary) and praying with our own words (i.e., just talking with God). Both have their place in the spiritual life and both are necessary. We might wonder, though: what do I say if I pray in my own words? Traditionally there are four types of prayer that we can move between when praying in our own words: prayers of petition (asking for things for ourselves), prayers of intercession (asking for things for others), prayers of thanksgiving (for what God has done), and prayers of praise (for who He is). It is important to include all four types in our prayer, lest we develop a distorted view of our relationship with God.

What about distractions in prayer? Given our fallen human nature and the fallen world in which we live, distractions are inevitable in prayer. That being said, we can (and should) work to mitigate their effects. One important thing to consider is our preparation for prayer. Just as athletes warm up before they begin their full physical activity, so we should "warm up" before prayer by seeking to calm our thoughts and quiet the area around us. We can also keep a little notebook by us when we pray, so that if an important thought occurs to us we can write it down and not have to spend mental energy trying to remember it through our time of prayer. But when the distractions come, we should not try and fight them; getting agitated in prayer just makes distractions worse. Instead, we can make a quick prayer about whatever the distraction is, and then let it go to return to whatever prayer we were doing.

Much more could be said about prayer, but this is a bulletin column, not a doctoral dissertation. So I will leave you with this encouragement when it comes to prayer: be like Nike, and "Just Do It."

40 DAYS FOR LIFE

The Cathedral Parish has been assigned two days to participate in the Forty Days for Life Campaign outside of **Planned Parenthood at 1144 Locust Street, Philadelphia, PA 19107**. We will be gathering on **Tuesday, April 8** to pray for an end to abortion and for the protection of all human life.

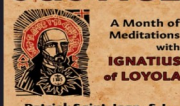
